This is a summary of how our school delivers music education to all our pupils across three areas – curriculum music, co-curricular provision and musical experiences – and what changes we are planning in future years. This information is to help pupils and parents or carers understand what our school offers and who we work with to support our pupils' music education.

Part A: Curriculum music

This is about what we teach in lesson time, how much time is spent teaching music and any music qualifications or awards that pupils can achieve.

- The total Music offer at Our Lady and St Paul's equals one hour per week.
- Our Music Curriculum is delivered by staff internally using the Cheranga Music scheme and supplemented by DIGIT music
- This curriculum is informed by the National Curriculum and the Model Music Curriculum (March 2021).
- During lessons, children have the opportunity to play tuned and non-tuned percussion instruments, such as: glockenspiels, djembe drums and recorders.
- We also offer a digital music unit using DIGIT music planning and technologies
- In addition, singing is a key topic focus.
- Within all units of work, children have the opportunity to listen/appraise music, create compositions and perform for others.

Part B: Co-curricular music

This is about opportunities for pupils to sing and play music, outside of lesson time, including choirs, ensembles and bands, and how pupils can make progress in music beyond the core curriculum.

- We have a school choir, which takes place weekly. Members have the opportunity to sing in the local community. For example; entertaining the residents of Millfield Crae home at Christmas
- The school currently does not offer additional tuition in music but does sign post individuals to where this could be available.

Part C: Musical experiences

This is about all the other musical events and opportunities that we organise, such as singing in assembly, concerts and shows, and trips to professional concerts.

- Children have a weekly opportunity to sing together in the school's Singing Worship.
- We hold annual school performances to share with families.
- Children are given the opportunity to sing in the local community e.g. local care homes.
- We also hold a yearly talent show to showcase singing and musical instrument tuition.
